Re: Blue Mountains Forest Plan Revision

On behalf of the Quality Deer Management Association (QDMA), we would like to state our support for the original proposed Blue Mountains Forest Plan Revision if and when the process for this region resumes. The QDMA is a national nonprofit wildlife conservation organization dedicated to ensuring the future of white-tailed deer, wildlife habitat and our hunting heritage. Founded in 1988, the QDMA has over 60,000 members nationwide and our membership includes hunters, landowners and natural resource professionals.

At QDMA, we believe that proper forest management practices are vital to the preservation of deer, wildlife habitat and the deer hunting tradition. With proper management of our forests being so vital to their successful preservation, it is important that we encourage sound, science-based forest management activities. The state of Washington contains some of the country's most scenic and valuable forests. That being said, we strongly encourage the United States Forest Service to continue to consider activities in a new plan that promote habitat enhancement, forest resiliency, and public access. It is extremely important that we encourage updated management practices that contribute to a resilient forest system that comports with the modern needs of forests in the United States. Additionally, we want to encourage the United States Forest Service to consider the impacts of facilitating the continued existence of a healthy deer population. A healthy deer population within Washington contributes to a deeply rooted hunting tradition. Deer hunters are an important driver of the local economy. According to the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation, Washington's hunters help contribute \$1.6 billion annually while supporting 21,823 jobs. The economic well-being of Washington depends on responsible management policies set forth by the United States Forest Service.

The deer that hunters pursue depend on the sound and updated forest management activities in this proposal. Additionally, hunters depend on increased access to engage in the time-honored tradition of hunting. Hunters are the original conservationists who have continually provided extensive funding to wildlife and habitat conservation efforts. In order to ensure this funding and the continued existence of wildlife on public lands, we must continue to encourage public access to these wild places.
