Re: Senate Study Bill 3116, Invest in Iowa Act

On behalf of the Quality Deer Management Association (QDMA), I am writing to state our support for Senate Study Bill 3116, the Invest in Iowa Act. The QDMA is a national nonprofit wildlife conservation organization dedicated to ensuring the future of white-tailed deer, wildlife habitat and our hunting heritage. Founded in 1988, the QDMA has over 50,000 members nationwide and our membership includes hunters, landowners and natural resource professionals.

The Invest in Iowa Act will help ensure the future of Iowa's natural resources. According to the Congressional Sportsmen's Foundation, Iowa hunters helped contribute \$41.79 million in 2018 in hunting related expenses. With 80% of state fish and wildlife agencies' funds dependent upon sportsmen and women, this contribution should not be taken lightly. It is an unfortunate reality that the money dedicated for conservation has been on a steady decline as the number of Iowa hunters afield diminishes.

In order to preserve white-tailed deer, wildlife habitat and our hunting heritage we are requesting your staunch support for this piece of legislation.
